

The rainfly covers the entire tent



This tent has a "bathtub" seam: i.e.; the seam is a couple of inches above the ground

IMO, this tent is ok for fair weather camping: however; if it rains heavily (as it does in Tampa), you may find your gear wet.

The rainfly only partially covers the tent and in a deluge, your tent may leak. If you purchase this type of tent, I recommend that you buy a tarp to also cover the tent.



The seam is at the bottom of the tent. If you get a heavy rain and water pools around your tent: this seam may leak.



IMO, this \$20 sleeping bag liner is a great investment. In FL you can sleep in this on top of your sleeping bag or inside of your sleeping bag. After camping, you turn it inside out and wash it. This saves wear and tear on the sleeping bag.

No matter what type of tent you purchase, I recommend using seam seal on all of the seams annually as this helps prevent leaks.
