NUMBER 1 Rule: NO food in tents!!!!

- UWaterproof ground cloth or plastic sheet
- Sleeping bag, pillow, air mattress or pad
- Cup, bowl, plate, knife, fork, spoon
- Mesh bag for drying mess kit (optional)

Clothes Bag

- Cub Scout Class A and B uniforms
- Dencho or raincoat (optional)
- Warm jacket or coat
- Dejamas or sweatshirt, sweatpants
- Underwear
- Shoes suitable for hiking (***must be closed toe***)
- Hat or cap
- Gloves
- Extra socks, shoes, other extra clothing

Family Gear - all optional

- Lawn chairs
- Cooler or ice chest
- Cot or pad

PACK 46 CAMPING CODE OF CONDUCT

Parents: please be sure to read these rules with your Scout and any other attendees.

Scouts and Parents Promise To:

- Conduct themselves in a matter that supports the values of the Scout Oath and Law.
- Follow the Outdoor Code and principles of Leave No Trace.
- Always wear appropriate clothing and footwear. Opentoed shoes are not allowed.
- Practice proper Fire Safety. No one except a designated adult or ScoutsBSA fire monitor shall place more wood into the fire, and no one shall remove anything once the fire is lit.
- Limit the use of electronic devices. Scouts and other youth shall leave all electronic devices (gaming devices, cell phones, etc.) at home. Adults shall restrict the use of electronic devices to functions supporting the Pack or campout.
- Prohibit the use of offensive or abusive language.
- Be respectful of your fellow campers. No running through tent area.
- Observe quiet hours. Unless otherwise communicated, quiet hours begin at 10 pm, and all youth are to remain in their tents until at least 6 am.
- Observe proper knife safety. Only Scouts who have earned their Whittling Chip may be in possession of a pocket knife. Fixed blade knives are not permitted.
- Not possess alcohol or tobacco products.
- Follow the rules of the places we visit and events we participate in.

BSA Youth Protection Rules (abridged) as applied to Pack 46 Campouts:

- One-on-one contact between adult leaders and youth members is prohibited. Only parents and legal guardians are allowed oneon-one contact with their youth.
- Restrooms and showers designed for multiple users are restricted to a single gender, and to either adults or youth. Appropriate signage will be provided and observed.
- Restrooms and showers designed for single users are to be occupied by only one person, or only family members.
- In Cub Scouting, only single families are allowed in tents. Youth may not enter the tent of another family.
- Lions and Tigers must always have their adult partner accompanying and directly supervising them.
- Any adult camping overnight must either be a parent or guardian of a registered Scout, or a registered BSA Adult Leader.

Violations of these policies should be promptly reported to the Cub Master, Committee Chair, Den Leader, or as outlined in the Guide to Safe Scouting.
